Many were hanged on Rushmere Heath and also out side the prison in St Helens Street Some became famous such as Margaret Catchpole of Ipswich, and William Corder (The Red barn murder)

their stories often repeated. Others have become forgotten in the mists of time.

Pip entertained us with his vast knowledge of these local events with pictures and newspaper entries backing up

his polished presentation. Pip skillfully played his guitar and sung two threehundred year old songs about the people of their time.
